PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Hope Members,

We continued to focus on our mission (knowing God, inspiring people, transforming lives) and vision (growing community through service, learning and worship) at Hope Lutheran Church in 2024, and we were blessed with another year where we could expand our impact in our community.

I continue to be impressed and proud as I reflect on all that our congregation does within our community. This report captures only a portion of all that Hope does. If you are looking for ways to get more involved, or if you have any questions about programs at Hope, I encourage you to contact one of the committee chairs, a council member, or staff member to ask questions and to learn more.

Hope continued to grow in 2024, and people continue to return to in-person worship. There are many Sundays when the parking lot is tight, and the pews are full. Sunday School attendance continues to grow, and the Confirmation class is active with many kids. Our stewardship appeal was a success, as we received pledge commitments from over 60% of the congregation and displayed nearly one hundred hands across the church showing many of the ways our congregation is engaged with service. Pledging and giving continues to remain strong, and Council and the Congregation approved a budget of \$1.041M, which is the highest ever for Hope. We thank you all for your continued support!

Moving into 2025 there are still opportunities (and challenges) that await our congregation. The Call Committee continues to make progress in our search for our next Associate Pastor. We have a new Youth and Family Ministry Coordinator that will be responsible for growing aspects of both our youth and our family programs. And a growing congregation like Hope will continue to look for opportunities to grow our community, mission, and our ministry in 2025 and beyond.

I want to thank the Pastors and staff for an amazing year. Pastor Ron and the staff have done an excellent job carrying forward without a full-time Associate Pastor. A big thank you to Pastor Bob who has done a wonderful job moving into the role of interim Associate Pastor. The staff has done an amazing job in growing our music (and a trip to Carnegie Hall in NYC!), growing our Christian Education Program, growing our communications and digital media presence, and the office staff has excelled at keeping Hope moving forward. We are blessed to have Pastor Ron, who continues to grow our congregation, allowing us to do more mission work each year.

2024 was a year of growth for Hope, and it was driven by you, members of our congregation, as well as our incredible Pastors and staff. I am honored to have served as Council President for the past two years and am thankful to be a part of such a vibrant, resilient, and vital congregation. Elizabeth Bauer will be taking over as President in 2025 and I look forward to working with her.

FROM THE PASTORS

Dear Hope Church Family,

One of my favorite books of the bible is Ezekiel. It begins with the prophet/priest sent to his minister to his own people with the words, "...go to the house of Israel and speak my very words to them. For you are not sent to a people of obscure speech and difficult language..." (Ez 3.4-5) Ezekiel goes and shares God's Word of law and good news to the Israelites in Babylonian exile. Like the prophet, I am here among my own people, since Hope has been Carol's and my church home after "retirement."

I was asked to serve Hope beginning in the middle of February 2024 as part time Interim Associate Pastor. To assist Pastor Brown primarily by doing visitation, other pastoral care as needed, and to preach a few weeks a month. Over the past year I did over 90 visits to those homebound or in the hospital. I also took on leading our weekly Wednesday morning adult bible study. I have begun teaching an evening seasonal study this Epiphany. I do enjoy the opportunities to get to know everyone better, preach, lead worship and teach; and am glad to be of assistance in this time of transition.

We pray that the Holy Spirit leads a pastor to the full time Associate call, however, until that time I am willing to continue to assist as I am able.

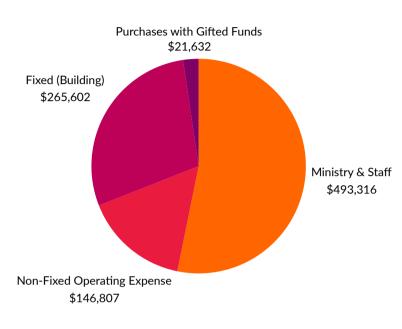

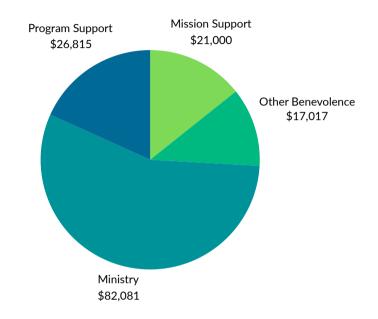


Stewardship & Finance Updates





Breakdown of Non-Fixed Operating Expenses: \$146,913



- Pledges provided for our Annual Appeal increased again over the prior year
- Total numbers of pledges were 210 versus 201 last year
- Total dollars pledged was \$803,000 versus \$759,000 last year
- \$685,000 was pledged to the Operating Budget, \$112,000 to the Building Fund and \$6,000 to the Long-Term Ministry Fund
- We feel that pledges provided indicate giving in 2025 should be sufficient to cover our budgetary needs when including unpledged giving
- As we look into 2026, we will be running our Pledge Appeal in the fall with more of a focus on raising funds to reduce our mortgage debt
- Other initiatives in 2025 include the highlighting of Gracious Givers at Hope, and how people give of their time and talents to the ministries at Hope
- We are blessed to have a community of believers at Hope that continue to increase in the giving of Time, Talent and Treasures

- Participation in the Adult Choir continues to increase

Thank you for your continued support, and may God bless each of you as we move forward into another year of ministry together.

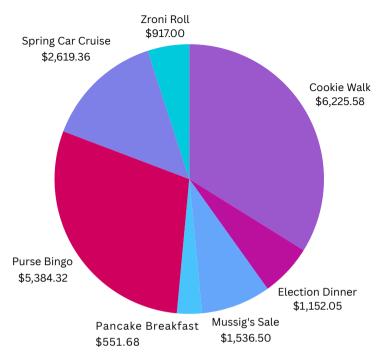

MUSIC MINISTRY

David's Psalm of Thanksgiving (1 Chronicles 16:7-36)

"Sing to the Lord, all the Earth. Tell of His salvation from day to day. Declare His glory among the nations, his marvelous works among all the peoples. For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; He is to be revered above all gods."

In this "hidden" Psalm, located outside of the cannon of Psalms, the new King of Israel, David, is at work to organize Israel and bring their focus to God. He brings the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem after it has traveled from city to city, he feeds the people with celebration bread, meat, and cakes made of raisins, and then he does something very interesting—being a man of song, David appoints specific Levites to make music, holy music, to usher in the Ark and help lead the celebration of God. With cymbals, trumpets, voices, and poetry — all were a part of this artful celebration of the most Holy God.

This context is familiar to me as Hope's Music Minister and it reminds me of the work that we do, together, at Hope—the intentional organizing of ourselves in worship and focusing ourselves towards God. The celebration meals that we share as we humbly accept God's grace. And of course, the music. The Holy music. The music that is offered with beggar's hearts for the sake of God. This is the work that we do together as we faithfully sing hymns that carry the Gospel message and uplift us for our week to come. This is the work that we do when we sing as a choir, offering something special to hearts opened to receive by the Spirit. This is the work that we do as we play our instruments and reflect and reveal the tonal beauty of God's ordained creation both through our Joyful Noise Band and through our Praise Band. This is the work we do when our smallest children lift their voices in song at VBS, Children's Choir, Youth Weekend, or our Christmas Children's Program. This is the work that we do, an outpouring of our praise and thanksgiving for God saving us, day in and day out—moment to moment.

I think this is what David was feeling. This bursting desire to praise God and offer our thanksgiving. David also ends this Psalm with a refrain that we would be wise to remember—"Save us, O God of our salvation." As we look back on all of the wonderful blessings that God has given us, may we look HUMBLY forward, asking God to SAVE US from our folly, from our sin, from our arrogance, and from all that might lead us astray from Him. As I reflect on God's blessings, I am so thankful and ever humbled that He has offered to me the responsibility of leading His people through music and song. This is something that I do not take lightly, and therefore, as I pray for our congregation this year, I ask that you pray for us as a staff as well, that we might lead in the most faithful way—the way of Christ.

As always, I want to take my last moments in this letter to thank our music staff, Ms. Beth Wehr, and Mr. Rob Lynch for their Christian friendship, and their faithful work. We all know how incredibly blessed we are to have these two. They lead us not only with their music, but their character and discipleship- and the latter is priceless. Last but not least, many thanks to our incredible staff who work tirelessly to keep Hope a place of beautiful worship, Emily, Brittany, Lauren, Pastor Bob, and Pastor Ron. All Glory to God, and many blessings this 2025 year!

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES

Saturday - December 7, 2024

The congregational meeting was called to order by Board President Todd Kane at 5:53 p.m. Todd explained that the congregation would be voting on the March 2024 congregational meeting minutes, the 2025 budget and the election of Board members.

Todd invited Kurt Johanknecht to provide an update on the Call Committee. Kurt stated there has been no meaningful progress. The Call Committee is checking with the Synod on a monthly basis. There have been some pastors who have reviewed our paperwork, but no one has taken further action. We do not have any information on who has viewed our position due to privacy issues. The expectation from the beginning has been that it will take 18-24 months to find the right person for our congregation and we are currently 6 months into the process. Todd asked the congregation to continue to pray for the Call Committee and the process of finding a new pastor. The first item to approve was the March 2024 congregational meeting minutes.
